A vibrant part of that honour of course attaches to you.

PUBLIC BENEFIT Tairbhe don pobal



Public benefit has always driven both the GAA and Club Tyrone. During 2023 the public benefits aided by Club Tyrone's ongoing support for Tyrone GAA included:

- Providing, managing and supporting Gaelic sporting, cultural and heritage activities for 55 GAA Clubs, 550 teams, and nearly 21,500 members across Tyrone.
- Preparing, organizing and fielding amateur, adult and underage Football and Hurling teams to represent our County and its 182,000 people.
- Managing and maintaining the Garvaghey Centre, our multi-layered facility which is now moving into its second decade, facilitating over half-a-million users since it opened.
- Renewing and significantly upgrading the Healy Park floodlights.
- Delivering initiatives to support and develop individual and community health and well-being.
- Tackling many of Tyrone's chronic service and facility deficits.
- Building pride and contentment in self, in community, and in place and helping us all to better understand and appreciate our people, history, culture and heritage

Tyrone GAA's 2023 'Enough is Enough' campaign seeking the long overdue 'dual-carriaging' of the notorious A5 has developed as one of Ireland's most powerful community-driven initiatives. Through it, Tyrone GAA has made a telling case on behalf of the people of Tyrone and beyond. It's now for government to respond accordingly. They too have public benefit obligations.



THE FINANCIALS Cúrsaí airgeadais

Every year we're in the envied position of being able to report on how well Tyrone GAA manages its finances.

At the end of 2023 our County posted yet another surplus, this time one of £31,998.

And within that, the big news story of the past year has the final clearing of all our Garvaghey debt. Tyrone's borrowings there, which peaked at almost £2.5m, were cleared on time and to target.

At a time when several major GAA capital projects face major financial issues, and when some levels of crippling GAA debt exist, Tyrone is rightly proud of its achievement here.


Garvaghey, still in pristine shape ten years on, is a telling expression of the vision, belief, commitment, and generosity of everyone in Club Tyrone. Without you, our Members, it wouldn't be there. And Tyrone GAA and Tyrone overall would be much the poorer.

Live streaming of our stellar 'Connollys of Moy' Club Championships has developed into a major income stream for Tyrone. Unfortunately, the pirate onward broadcasting of that coverage has started to significantly reduce Tyrone's income stream there. It's a sad reality that continued pirating will inevitably lead to the closure of the streaming. Tyrone cannot afford to underwrite broadcasting that others then steal.
